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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

For the year ended 31 May 2019

The Trustees present their report along with the financial statements for the SCIO for the year ended 31 May 2019. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on page 10 and comply with the SCIO's constitution, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The organisation's purposes are:

- To advance education by providing tuition in the form of writing workshops and classes, materials, and facilities to service users, increasing the levels of literacy, self-esteem and aspiration in under-resourced young people aged 8 -18;
- To advance arts, heritage and culture by facilitating the creation and publication of written, visual and artistic material by service users;
- To support those who by reason of financial hardship would be otherwise unable to engage extra-curricular English language writing skills or creative tuition by providing appropriate facilities, materials and tuition;
- To provide literacy and creative expression activities with the object of building academic, emotional, and employment skills for under resourced young people aged 8 18 by providing tuition, materials and facilities which would otherwise be beyond their means;
- To promote equality and diversity by striving to close the attainment gap between the catchment area's service users and the rest of Edinburgh through creative and educational activities.

The principal activity in pursuit of the charitable objects will be the implementation of writing workshops and the opening and operation of a writing and mentoring centre that improves literacy, self-esteem and fosters aspiration among under-resourced students from 8 -18.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

During the 2018-2019 fiscal year the Super Power Agency was able to expand from the two workshops that began with 34 pupils at Leith Academy to working with 850 pupils at Leith Academy, Broughton High School, Leith Primary, Lorne Primary, Hermitage Park Primary and Craigentinny Primary, as well as another 75 pupils in our storytelling and bookmaking workshops at Niddrie Mill Primary, Dalry Primary and Tynecastle High School.

In total we were able to offer 206 hours of literacy support to young people with the help of 69 community volunteers. This support came in several forms including our 1.5 hour storytelling and bookmaking workshops, to helping S5 and S6 pupils with their English portfolios for their National Assessments, to our longer nine and twelve week writing workshops.

It is during our nine and twelve week workshops that our publications are created. During the year pupils created three perfect bound books, four chapbooks and one magazine. A description of each of the publications from the workshops is below:

A State of... (insert either Love, Stress, Family, Freedom, Murder, Mind, or Time): This series of one act plays were written by seven S6 students at Leith Academy using different news stories as the catalyst for their creativity to tackle some of the most complex issues of their time.

Through the Years - Connecting Present to Past: Our first book at Broughton High School, is the result of an intergenerational pen pals project in which twenty S2 students wrote to residents and members of neighbouring elder care facilities near the school. The pen pals then met face to face to compare stories and share their lives. You can see the results of the meeting in a film we made of the experience - https://vimeo.com/326301391. The letters, photos, and the students' reflections on the assignment make up the published book.

Seven Spaceships: This book is a joint publication between our four primary schools partners: Leith, Lorne, Craigentinny and Hermitage Park primaries. Using the lens of science fiction, the writing workshops and the stories they produced about travelling to the new world of Alba Prime were aimed at helping the 174 pupils deal with their feelings about transitioning to high school.

The four chapbooks (books we bind in-house) included: *Leith Tastes of Salt and Sauce* written by twenty-five thirteen year olds and *If I Ruled the World* written by twenty fifteen year olds. Both classes at Leith Academy spent twelve weeks exploring different styles of poetry and created individual and group works for the publications. At Broughton High School, fifty S1 students created the chapbook, *The Unicorn, The Kelpie and The Flamingobear*, a collection of new myths and legends for Scotland. Another Fifteen S2 boys from our Reframing Masculinity created *What I Think* a short book in which they ponder some of life's big questions and let you know how a fourteen year old boy goes about their day.

Finally, fifteen S1 boys from the second Reframing Masculinity workshop at Broughton High School created a lifestyle magazine for incoming pupils called *Surviving Broughton High* which will be distributed to all new pupils at the start of the Autumn term.

These eight publications act as a proof point for the ability of disadvantaged and under-resourced youth, many who are left out and left behind, to excel when provided with opportunities to share their opinions and their voices in a creative environment. These publications also give us examples to use as we make our case for expansion of our creative writing workshops to other schools in Edinburgh and eventually all of Scotland.

We hired two new staff members: Cal McDonald came on board as our new Programme Director in November 2018 and Claire Heffernan came on as our new Volunteer Coordinator in May 2019. We recruited two new board members, Phoebe Grigor and Nick Reid.

Funds raised over the year amounted to £81,737 (2018: £104,326) with the majority of funding coming from foundations and trusts new to the Super Power Agency. Expenditure for the year came to £118,303 (2018: £59,615). Major expenditure of the year included the purchase of 19 new computers courtesy of a grant from the KPE4 Charitable Trust.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The charity generated total income of £81,737 (2018: £104,326) and recorded expenditure of £118,303 (2018: £59,615). There was net expenditure of £23,036 (£10,499) on unrestricted funds and net expenditure of £13,530 (2018: net income of £55,210) on restricted funds, before transfers.

Reserves Policy

The trustees have adopted a reserves policy through which we aim to build and maintain a minimum level of unrestricted reserves equivalent to three months of running costs.

As of the end of the year, total funds amounted to £23,702 (2018: £60,268), of which £73 deficit was unrestricted (2018: £15,058 surplus), including £18,036 (2018: £12,667) as designated fixed assets, and £23,775 was restricted (2018: £45,210).

Risk Management

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the SCIO is exposed, in particular those relating to the operations and finances of the SCIO, and are satisfied that systems are in place to manage exposure to those risks.

FUTURE PLANS

We are excited to begin work with new partner Portobello High School on workshops for the coming school year. We also have tentative commitments from our current primary school partners and are looking forward to potentially working with the primary schools that feed into Broughton High School. By our estimates, we are scheduled to work with more than 1200 young people in the coming year at seven schools and will publish five new books.

We also hope to hire another programme coordinator to help with our growing organisation. Demand for our workshops is increasing and having another staff member focus on helping us bring more quality programming to schools will be a necessity.

We will also begin the search for a space to create our youth writing centre. The search for a space was put on hold while we got our writing workshops up and running with our school partners. We are hoping to open our new writing centre in time for the 2020-2021 school year.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Constitution

Super Power Agency is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation, charity number SC046550, incorporated under its constitution and recognised as a charity on 16 May 2016.

Members

Membership is open to any individual aged 16 or over who support the charity's aims. Employees are not eligible for membership.

Trustees, Recruitment and Appointment of New Trustees

The Board of Trustees is responsible for the management of the charity and the safeguarding of its assets. Trustees are recruited to the Board with a view to cultivating a mix of skills and experiences across a broad range of relevant disciplines.

The Trustees are elected, appointed or co-opted in accordance with the terms of the Constitution. The maximum number of Trustees is 12 and the minimum number is 8.

Induction and Training of new Trustees

New Trustees are often already familiar with the practical work of the charity. On appointment new Trustees are introduced to the existing trustees and briefed on the charity's current activities. Previous Trustee Meeting Minutes and Annual Accounts are available to all new Trustees.

Organisational Structure

The Trustees meet regularly, to oversee the operation of the Charity and determine its strategic direction and policies. A scheme of delegation is in place whereby the day-to-day responsibility for operation and administration rests with the Chief Executive Officer, Gerald Richards.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

For the year ended 31 May 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

At 31 March 2019 the general fund is in deficit by £18,109 and general funds in deficit by £73 indicating a material uncertainty about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern. The trustees are actively raising additional funds and, with positive net current liabilities, expect the charity to be able to meet its liabilities as they fall due for a period of at least 12 months from approval of the accounts. Given this, they conclude the charity is a going concern and continue to adopt the going concern basis for preparing the accounts.

Income

All income is included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity has entitlement, it is probable that the resources will be received and the monetary value be measured with sufficient reliability.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to that category. Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the category of resource expended for which it was incurred. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of expenditure:

- Costs of raising funds comprise those costs directly associated with generating donations and fundraising income.
- Charitable activity expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its
 activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such
 activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them, including governance
 costs. Indirect expenditure is allocated between activities based on staff time.
- Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity.

Tangible Fixed Assets

Assets are initially recorded at cost and only assets over £500 are capitalised. Depreciation is provided in annual instalments over the estimated useful lives of the assets. The rates of depreciation are as follows:-

- Motor Vehicles 25% per annum
- Computer Equipment 33.33% per annum

Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds are income receivable without specified purpose and are available as general funds.
